- 1) In the top menu bar of the Lumi panel, you will see the messaging icon in the center to enter the speaker queue it looks like a double speech bubble: Click it
- 2) When you click the icon, a list of choices appear that give you options for what you want to do including:

MOTION- To make a motion or amendment

SECOND- To second an amendment

DISCUSS- Speak in favor of or against a motion or ask a question of a presenter PROCESS (please indicate point of order, suspend the rules, point of privilege, appeal)

3) TYPE what you want to do into the text box at the bottom of the screen. You might even have to scroll down to see the text box at the bottom of the screen. Then click the arrow on the right of the text box to submit your request to speak. If you have submitted your request to speak correctly, you will briefly see a pop-up message that says "Received".



- 4) When called on to speak by the Speaker, raise your hand in Zoom To raise your hand, go to the Zoom panel on the right of the screen and look at the bottom for the raise your hand button
- 5) You will then be prompted to start your video and unmute your microphone. Click unmute myself and begin speaking stating your name and member unit first. Once you are finished speaking the production team will mute you again

If you raise your hand in Zoom without being called upon, your hand will be lowered, and you will be overlooked.



Voting:

If you have voting rights, the motion and answer choices will automatically appear before you in the Lumi panel on the left side of the screen.

To submit your vote, simply click on your choice and it will be highlighted. You don't need to do anything else, just click your choice. There is no send button. You will see a confirmation message that your vote has been received just below the title of the motion.

Should you wish to change your vote, you may simply select a different choice. You may do this as many times as you wish until the vote is closed. At that time, you cannot make another choice and only your last choice is counted.





Background

Pilot started 2017

- A demonstration project to test viability and the best process for implementation
- Only schools and programs in public health eligible initially
- Offered the academic community an additional tool to attract the top students

Goals

- Increase student membership and build up pipeline of tomorrow's leaders
- Create broader APHA communities in participating schools/programs



Background

- Schools/programs buy bulk student memberships at a discount
 - Sliding scale based on number of students OR 33% discount off student rate
- Faculty liaison and Student Assembly Campus Liaison
- Engagement efforts
 - Automated emails: welcome; how to get involved
 - Student Assembly personalized emails (in process of being implemented)
 - Each school provided an on-line community for students
 - Quarterly webinars conducted by Student Assembly
- Pandemic impact
 - Extended pilot an additional year
 - "Muddies" the evaluation data—first 2 years program grew with increasing member numbers and revenue then pandemic related reductions



Evaluation – The Numbers

- 1. Di we increase the total number of student members? Yes, by about 10% per year until pandemic
- 2. How many STB members a) converted to ECP or regular membership? or b) dropped membership when no longer STB member? Difficult to answer because most programs are 2-4 years long and pandemic hit just as we would have hoped to see the first of those conversions.
- 3. What was impact on STB member numbers compare to other membership categories? The first 2 years of the program (pre-pandemic), most of the individual membership categories experienced a slight decline while total student membership grew.
- 4. How many schools/programs were involved? 26 over the life of the program Renewed? 9 to date Current? 13—again, impact of pandemic on schools makes this difficult to understand the implications.

Cost difficult to determine: Each 40-50 students takes about 6 hours staff time to process; Recruitment/marketing; onboarding and engaging new members; supporting schools/programs; retaining schools/programs; volunteer time of Student Assembly not calculated



Evaluation - The Process

1. How was the program promoted to schools?

- School-sponsored Programs page
- Pamphlets
- Letters to deans
- Word of mouth
- Dr. B presenting programs

2. How can we improve promotion?

- Increased digital advertising
- Cross-promotion through APHA marketing channels

3. How did schools inform students?

The school's point of contact or program administrator have been notifying the student through email.

4. Did STB increase student engagement at the schools and with APHA?

Yes, based on the limited results of the evaluation surveys (one to students, one to the faculty liaisons)



Evaluation - The Process

- 5. How did SA provide services to STB members? How engaged were STB members?
 - Student Assembly webinars, scholarships, professional development opportunities
 - Student Assembly newsletters
 - Student Assembly leadership opportunities
 - Engagement? –no data
- 6. Was the SA able to recruit and support Campus Liaisons (CLs) at the Student Bulk schools?
 - Yes, SA recruited about 20 CLs from STB schools; currently around 100 CLs total
- 7. How can we improve the STB member experience in APHA?
 - Overwhelming desire for APHA to provide a mentorship program for new or renewing students.
 (based on surveys and conversations with students)



Conclusions

- 1. Success in engaging more schools & students pre-pandemic
- 2. Expect that refining the process and expanding the programs beyond schools/programs of public health can grow schools, programs and student members
- 3. As we develop the pipeline of more students in the SA, we need to make sure they have the services and support they need during the student years and transition to ECPs.
- 4. If we can support students and help in these transitions, we can create more loyal APHA members for a lifetime.
- 5. Additional staff support is needed to grow the program and ensure adequate program support by a position that focuses on Student Assembly and Early Career Professionals



Recommendations

- 1. Make the program permanent
- 2. Provide only one payment option: discounted student member rate
- 3. Allow schools/programs to enroll a subset of students with a 5-student minimum for the bulk rate
- 4. Expand the program to include "allied" professions such as nursing, social work, engineering, transportation, education, planning, etc.
- 5. Create a more personalized onboarding and support system
- 6. Expand content offerings to participating programs and map content to CEPH core competencies to assist with accreditation requirements
- Assure adequate resources to provide quality program given expected growth

2021 Strategic Planning Committee Report Successes and Challenges

Successes

Clarified that the strategic plan is for the whole organization Increased visibility and communication of the plan

Clarified that goals and objectives should be SMART and something we can influence directly

Challenges:

Integration of affiliates, sections, staff into the strategic plan

Educating affiliates, sections, staff on how to use the strategic plan

Updates to the Strategic Plan are coming and will be coordinated with work on APHA Your Way (formerly MUEEP)



Recommendations for the 2022 Strategic Planning Committee include:

- Follow a timeline that includes process evaluation for development and implementation of new strategic plan
 - will contribute to institutional memory about the planning process next time
- Ensure that new strategic plan objectives are based on outcomes APHA can directly influence
- Ensure data gathered for APHA Your Way (MUEEP) used for developing the new strategic plan; utilize resources from Member Units to gather info to fill in gaps



4.0 Bylaws ProposalsMitch Haas, DC, MAChair, Committee on Bylaws



1. Action Board

The Bylaws Committee moves to amend the bylaws to streamline the Action Board:

- VII.1.A. There shall be an Action Board, whose function shall be to plan, organize, and mobilize others to advance APHA's advocacy priorities. To this end it-the Action Board shall collaborate with Affiliates, Caucuses, Sections, and other appropriate units of APHA to promote and engage the membership in activities to support APHA's annual advocacy priorities and other advocacy activities as identified by the Executive Director.; encourage establishment of relationships with organizations outside of APHA with interest in joint action; assist in the development of a comprehensive body of policy statements for APHA; and review annually progress in promoting engagement of APHA members, Affiliates, and Caucuses in advocacy and participation in the policy statement development process. The Action Board is encouraged to collaborate with experts, internally and externally, and other relevant entities to enhance the accomplishment of its goals.
- VII.1.B. There shall be seventeen voting members of the Action Board including the Student Assembly Representative In addition to the Chair, Chair-designate, and Student Assembly representative, the membership of the Action Board shall consist of three members at large, one representative of each of the Sections chosen from three names submitted by each Section, and three two representatives of the Affiliated Associations Affiliates chosen appointed from three names submitted by the Council of Affiliates...
- **IX.1.G.** ... The Action Board representative shall be an ex officio voting member of the Section Council....
- **IX.4.B.iv.** The three two Affiliate Representatives on the Action Board shall be ex officio voting members of the CoA.

Amend the bylaws to streamline the Action Board as proposed by the Committee on Bylaws



2. Sections

The Bylaws Committee moves to amend the bylaws to create the Treasurer and Section Student Liaison positions:

- **IX.1.A.** Composition. Each Section shall elect its own officers, <u>Section Student Liaison</u>, <u>Section Councilors</u>, and Governing Councilors ...
- **IX.1.B.** Officers. The officers of each Section shall be the Chair, Chair-elect, Immediate Past Chair, <u>Treasurer</u>, and Secretary.
- IX.1.F. The Treasurer shall manage Section finances.
- **IX.1.G.** The Section Student Liaison shall serve as a link between the Section and Student Assembly, as a member of both, to ensure student perspectives and priorities are represented.
- **IX.1.H.** Section Council. There shall be a Section Council composed of the Section officers, <u>Section Student Liaison</u>, and six Section Councilors to be known as the elective members...
- **III.1.C.** ...No APHA member may hold the office of Chair, Chair-elect, Immediate Past Chair, Secretary, <u>Treasurer, Section Student Liaison</u>, Governing Councilor, or Section Councilor simultaneously within the same or across different Sections/SPIGs.



Motion 2

Amend the bylaws to create the Treasurer and Section Student Liaison positions as proposed by the Committee on Bylaws



3. Council of Affiliates

The Bylaws Committee moves to amend the bylaws to create the Affiliate Representative at Large, broaden Secretary eligibility, and set terms & term limits:

- **IX.4.B.** The CoA shall consist of the Regional Affiliate Representatives, the members of the leadership, the Affiliate Representative at Large, and the Executive Board appointed members. ...
- **IX.4.B.ii.** The CoA Chair, Chair-elect, Secretary and immediate past Chair shall be voting members of this body and serve a one-year term. The Secretary shall be a voting member, serve for a period of two years, and not be eligible to serve in that capacity for at least one year after expiration of two consecutive terms.
- **IX.4.B.iii.** The Affiliate Representative at Large shall be nominated and elected by the membership of the CoA at the Annual meeting from among the Affiliate members who will not be serving on the CoA in the coming year. This representative shall be a voting member of the CoA, serve for a period of two years and not be eligible to serve in that capacity for at least one year after expiration of two consecutive terms.
- **IX.4.B.iv.** Three voting members shall be appointed by the Executive Board and shall include one representative from the Student Assembly and one state affiliate executive director or equivalent staff person. The Student Assembly appointment is for a one-year term. Each of the The remaining appointed members shall serve for a period of two years in staggered terms and not be eligible to serve in that capacity for at least one year after expiration of two consecutive terms. except that the Student Assembly appointment is for a one-year term.
- **IX.4.D.** The leadership of the CoA shall consist of a Chair, Chair-elect, Secretary and an immediate past Chair. that serve a one-year term and are voting members.
- **IX.4.D.iii.** The Secretary shall be nominated and elected <u>from amongby</u> the <u>entire</u> voting membership of the CoA at the annual meeting <u>from among the ARGCs</u>, <u>preferably</u>, <u>or other Affiliate members who will not be serving on the CoA in the coming year.</u>

Regular proposed policy statements

As a reminder, 20 proposed policy statements were re-submitted in August and reviewed by the JPC in September

17 received positive assessments in this 2nd review; 3 received negative assessment (B6, B8 and D1)

The authors of B6 and D1 moved their proposed policy statements forward to public hearings despite the negative assessment; B8 was withdrawn and will be resubmitted in 2022



Late Breakers

5 Late Breakers were submitted by the October 15th deadline. (1 late-breaker was submitted October 16th after the deadline and was thus not reviewed)

2 or the 5 were accepted by the JPC co-chairs and moved to the public hearings. The remaining three were not accepted as they did not meet the criteria for a late-breaker:

- Emergent issue
- No existing policy statement on topic
- Action steps that are directly related to and address the problem and evidence presented



Public Hearings

2 very successful public hearings were held on Monday, Oct. 18 (Group A, C and Late-Breakers) and Tuesday, Oct. 19 (Groups B and D)

75+ participants at each



Archiving

- No requests to keep statements active were received by the JPC so all 26 policy statements will automatically archive at the close of the Annual Meeting
