Report of the President to the Governing Council

I took office at the end of our first virtual annual meeting just as the Covid-19 pandemic was heading to its first peak. Because of this, I was unable to visit any affiliates in person but was invited to and participated remotely in the annual meetings of 17 of affiliates. I was slated to speak with most of them, but other opportunities emerged as well. I am grateful to Past President Lisa Carlson and to President Elect Kaye Bender for covering some meetings I was not able to attend. Even through my computer screen, I could sense the passion and the commitment public health professionals bring to their jobs every single day.

In addition to these presentations, I was invited to represent the Association at other meetings across the country on matters of equity and health workforce diversity.
