





California drought crisis



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
California's Drought

California is entering the fourth year of a recordbreaking drought creating an extremely parched landscape. Governor Jerry Brown declared a drought State of Emergency in January 2015 and imposed strict conservation measures statewide.


In this photo, a tractor collects golf balls on a driving range in the Palm Springs area, California, April 13, 2015.

The average daily water usage per person in Palm Springs is 201 gallons, more than double California average. Communities where residential customers use more than 165 gallons of water per person per day would have to cut back by 35 percent.

Persons with special health conditions and persons who were elderly, poor, or differently abled were the most likely to die.


Low-income African Americans often could not evacuate because they had no personal transportation.

Human and Civil Rights Framework

HUMAN RIGHTS

- Right to Self Determination
- Right to Safe and Healthy Work Conditions
- Right to Highest Standard of Physical and Mental Health
- Right to Food
- Right to a Decent Living Condition
- Equal Rights Between Men and Women
- Right of Youth and Children to be Free From Exploitation

CIVIL RIGHTS

- Ensuring peoples' physical integrity and <u>safety</u>.
- Protection from <u>discrimination</u> on grounds such as <u>gender</u>, <u>religion</u>, <u>race</u>, <u>sexual</u> <u>orientation</u>, <u>national origin</u>, <u>age</u>, immigrant status, etc.
- Equal access to health care, <u>education</u>, culture, etc.

Equity Framework

- **Procedural equity** encompasses fairness in political processes and participation in decision making.
- **Distributive equity** highlights the need to consider not just the allocation of benefits, but also the costs and risks with a focus on the outcomes of allocation decisions.
- **Contextual equity** recognizes the fact that the playing field is never level but that people's capabilities and their access to resources and power determine the extent to which they are able to utilize procedural equity to determine the best distributive outcome for themselves.







US Earthquake Fault Zones










